Tudors	The English royal dynasty which held the throne from the accession of Henry VII in 1485 until the death of Elizabeth I in 1603.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> To know where the Tudors are placed on a timeline. To know how lives in the past are different from ours. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Tudor dynasty reigned from 1485, after King Henry VII claimed the throne after the Battle of Bosworth, and ended in 1603 after the final Tudor monarch died. Henry VIII married 6 times. His wives were; Catherine of Aragon, Anne Boleyn, Jane Seymour, Anne of Cleves, Catherine Howard and Catherine Parr. The Tudor rose was formed after The Battle of Bosworth, which was a war between York and Lancaster. Henry VIII reformed the Catholic Church and became head of the Church of England. This was to allow himself to divorce his first wife. The Tudor dynasty influenced many things in the UK, including; the Royal Navy, the Royal Mail and laws for poorer people.
Henry VIII	He was the second Tudor monarch, succeeding his father in 1509 until his death in 1547. He is best known for his six marriages and the reformation of the church.		
Monarchy	A monarchy is an undivided rule by one single person. In the Tudor's case, this person was King Henry VIII		
Protestant	A person who is a follower of a Christian Church, which are separate from the Catholic Church. Henry VIII led the Protestant rising and became head of its Church.		
Catholic	Catholic followers are led by the Pope. Henry VIII wanted to stray away from this religion due to its rules on divorce.		
Reformation	This is the process of changing something. During the Tudor Dynasty, Henry VIII wanted to reform the Catholic Church and created the Church of England.		
Divorce	To legally separate yourself from another person.		
Persecution	This means to treat another person or community unfairly and often cruelly.		
Execution	To carry out a death sentence.
